

Microsoft strives to be a good neighbor and to create a positive impact in the communities that host our datacenters. We invest in people through skill-building programs and partner with local programs to promote environmental sustainability and support the community.

Here is an overview of our investments in East Point, Georgia.

Building tech skills

The Microsoft Datacenter Academy at Atlanta Technical College will help East Point students and residents earn the skills needed for entry-level positions in the technology sector. Announced in November 2022, this technical training program will feature access to a new technology lab and datacenter internship opportunities.

Microsoft Technology Education and Learning Support (TEALS) will bring computer science learning to 37 Georgia high schools in the 2023–2024 school year, including Banneker and Global Impact Academy high schools.

Nonprofit Tech Acceleration (NTA) and Tech Impact offer skill-building and technology support to East Point nonprofits like *The Ludacris Foundation, Skeegee Golden Tigers, Ballethnic Dance Company,* and *Green City Development Group*.

Microsoft Philanthropies supports Atlanta Technical College (with STRIVE Atlanta and the Accelerate Atlanta Coalition) to deliver non-traditional IT training pathways to East Point residents.
